Are you, and those who depend on you, prepared for an emergency?

City services including police, fire and utilities may be very scarce or unavailable during a disaster. Be sure to have at least a 3-day supply of water, food, medicines, warm clothing, first aid supplies and other emergency provisions for yourself, your family, your pets, and others who depend on you.

Do you know about the West Seattle Emergency Communication Hubs?



The hubs are our emergency community gathering places in case a major disaster, such as an earthquake, makes it impossible to get information or help in the usual ways.

The West Seattle emergency communication hubs are part of a citywide radio network that will be activated during an emergency. Even if phones, power, internet, roads and/or bridges are out, the hubs will be able to communicate with the Seattle Office of Emergency Management and from neighborhood-to-neighborhood.

Pre-established hub locations will allow our community to come together quickly to respond to a disaster.

You can come to a hub to provide information or ask for help. You can also volunteer your help, skills, resources, tools and equipment!
